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ConsumerReports Best Buy Drugs

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- Drug prices long available
- Web explosion in last 3 years, online comparison tools
- States, employers, insurers, PBMs much more active
- Prices vary widely between stores
- Canada influential 2002-2004 – not as much now
- Medicare Part D – driving force now
- Renewed recent media attention
- Big Box stores – cheaper and volume growing

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The Other Big Question:

Is Rx drug price transparency a model for other health care prices?

Answer:

Probably not. But it has made consumers more aware.

[Linkto Buy!](#) Prosand Cons

- A marketplace – except for the AG sites
- Selective contracting at many sites
- But mostly good, easy-to-use
- Evidence: consumers are checking online then buying at a pharmacy

State Price Listing Sites

- Big Three: NY, MD, and FL
- Increasing traffic at all three
- NY requires signs referring to AG in stores
- Limits: top 25 drugs in NY, top 50 FL, MD, 33?
- Not all pharmacies in Florida
- Little information about health coverage, Medicare

Will Other States Follow?

- Not a stampede, but momentum
- Maine, IL, WI – passed this year
- Others considering
 - NJ, OH, RI, IN, NM
 - DC – passed, now in court
 - GA – passed a law requiring all pharmacy bills to have full cost

Employer, Insurer, PBMEfforts

- Mainly online tools, but some print materials
- Compare prices, shift to generics, get mail order
- Medco: launch new price-compare tool in March; 100,000 prices checked per week
- Express Scripps: similar tools, drive to generics
- Lumenos (Wellpoint): can check drug prices by cell phone

What's Missing?

Prices alone are sometimes enough,
but what consumers *really* want to know
is not what is cheapest but:

- An experiment in EBM. Comparative value!
- Launched in December 2004
- Translation of Drug Effectiveness Review Project (DERP) evaluations
- Combine effectiveness, safety, side effects, and cost information
- Choose *Best Buys*
- Many are generics, but not all

- Typical savings: \$1,000 to \$2,000 a year
- 13 categories to date; over 60% of Rx spending
- HBP, cholesterol, asthma, ADHD, arthritis, Alzheimer's
- www.crbestbuydrugs.org
- Outreach effort in 5 states
- Around 800,000 downloads to date
- Some insurers have used, linked, sent print materials
- In negotiations now with potential distributors

Statins for high cholesterol

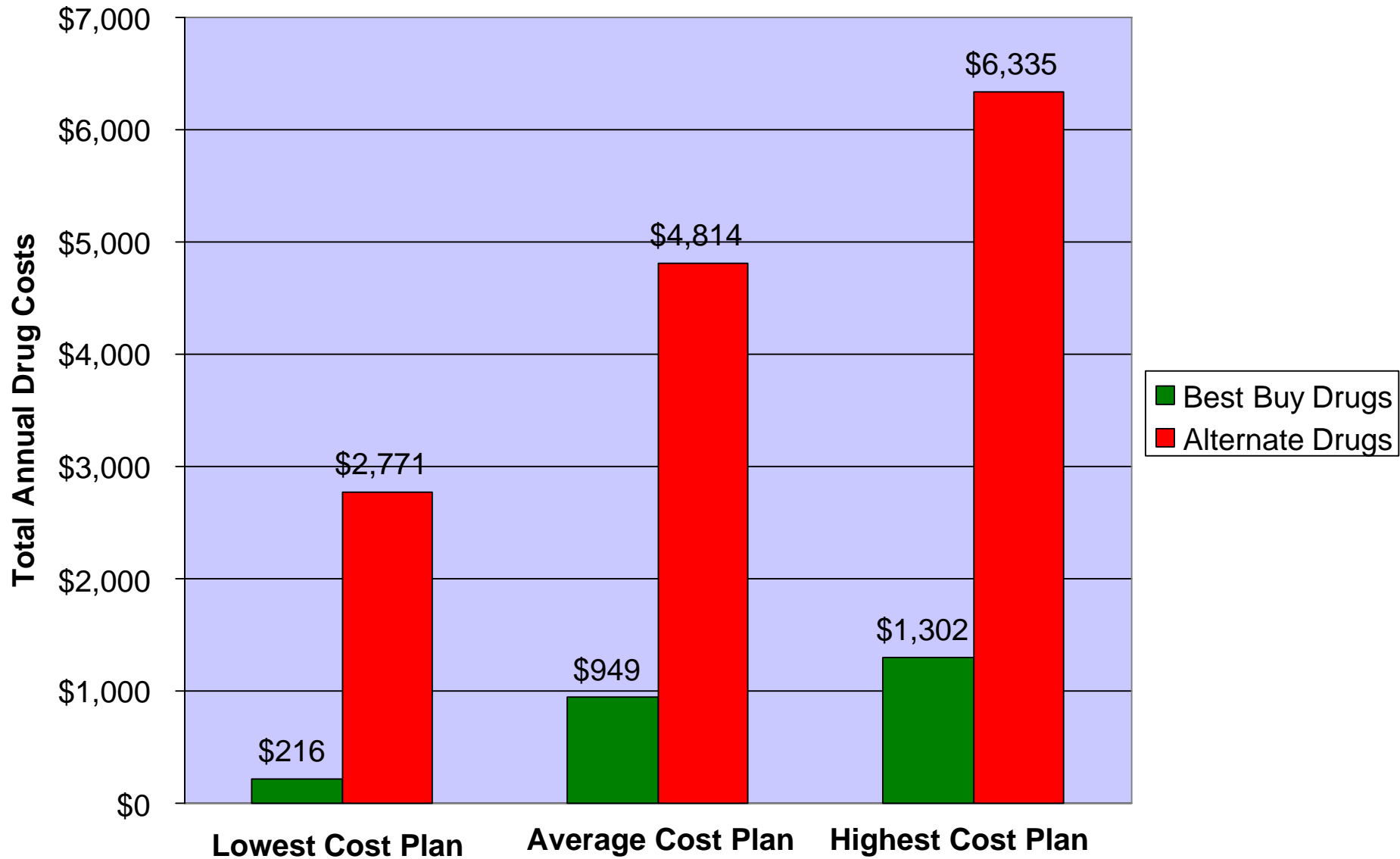

- AARP also has translation of DERP on their Web site
- DERP now 15 states, including NY and CA
- **All** should sponsor translations for consumers
- DERP should spread to 10 more states
- Assessing **value** is harder but the way to go
- Synergistic with EBM movement
